

OFS Postgraduate Survey pilot 2022 - Liaison Officer Guidance

(Updated 4 May 2022)

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Introduction to the OFS Postgraduate Pilot survey

UCL will participate in the new pilot survey for students in the final year of their taught postgraduate programme. The survey will run from 19 April to 31 May and can be completed via www.postgradsurvey.co.uk.

The survey is organised by the Office for Students (OFS) and managed by Ipsos MORI, an independent research agency. Ipsos MORI also organise the annual National Student Survey (NSS) on behalf of the OFS, and the Postgraduate Survey will feature reminder SMS messages and phone calls for eligible students yet to complete the survey, similar to the NSS campaign.

UCL will not participate in the 2022 Postgraduate Taught Experience Survey (PTES), and UCL will continue to review the options for future postgraduate surveys.

Unlike the NSS, results from the pilot will not be publicly available but department and programme-level results will be shared internally, providing at least 10 responses have been received at that level. The OFS will not share UCL's results with other institutions participating in the pilot but may compile a report on the sector-wide postgraduate taught experience survey.

The survey is open to students in the final year (usually the **only** year for full-time postgrads) of a taught postgraduate programme. This includes programmes at Master's, PGCert and PGCE levels. More information on eligibility can be found in the 'Student Eligibility' section of this guide.

The role of the PGS Liaison Officer/s

There is at least one PGS Liaison Officer (PGSLO) in each UCL department that has taught postgraduates. The duties of the departmental PGSLO include:

- Ensure the correct students from the department are included in the Postgraduate Survey (PGS) sample and advise the Student Engagement & Experience team if any additions or removals are required;
- Encourage student participation in the PGS within departments or other department-level academic units (e.g. divisions, institutes, schools etc.);
- Build staff awareness of the PGS and where appropriate coordinate promotional activity;
- Liaise with Student Engagement & Experience team in coordinating PGS promotional activity;
- Share any examples of promotional good practice for further transmission across UCL;
- Provide feedback at the end of the survey to the Student Engagement & Experience team.

Data Privacy and Security

The Office for Students (OfS) have a full [privacy statement](#) relating to the storage, handling of, and type of data collected. After the survey has finished in June 2022, all students' details will be removed from Ipsos MORI's computer systems.

PGS 2022 questionnaire

The Postgraduate Survey has 26 core questions, relating to ten aspects of the student experience, plus two summative questions:

- 1) Motivation for study
- 2) Information
- 3) Course design and content
- 4) Course organisation and management
- 5) Teaching and learning
- 6) Assessment and feedback
- 7) Dissertation or major project
- 8) Learning resources
- 9) Academic support
- 10) Student voice

Unlike the NSS, the Postgraduate Survey does not include any open text comments. You can find the full questionnaire on the [UCL Teaching & Learning Portal](#).

Student eligibility for the PGS

There are strict criteria governing inclusion or removal from the PGS sample. The list of eligible students was sent to Liaison Officers for checking on Thursday 24 February, with a deadline for returns of Thursday 10 March.

Eligible Students

The Postgraduate Survey (PGS) aims to survey postgraduate taught students in the final year of their course. The criteria for inclusion in the PGS are the following:

- Students must be studying a course at postgraduate level that is mainly taught e.g. Master's, PGCE, PGDip and PGCert.
- Students should be actively engaged in study i.e., not taking a break or sabbatical from study. Students on work placements should be included.
- **Students must have completed or be expected to complete an eligible course between 1 November 2021 and 31 October 2022.** Expected to complete means the date of last scheduled activity by a student and should include the end of the scheduled exam period, or formal writing up period, but excluding retakes and exceptional extensions to the writing up period.
- Students should be taught wholly or mainly in the UK. Students from overseas campuses should not be included.

Assessment of the student's work does not need to have been completed, nor any award made. A student who has completed all other requirements and then hands in their dissertation between these dates would be expected to be included.

Students studying towards a stated learning aim or award without a defined course length or end date should be surveyed if they entered their second consecutive year of active study after 1 August 2021. Students studying without an end date who began their course in the 2021-22 academic year and are known to have completed more than 66% of the requirements by the start of the survey period (19 April 2022) should also be included. Requirements in this case may be decided either using credits completed or the number of modules completed.

Additions

If you notice that there is a student who meets the above criteria and is missing from the list, please notify the Student Engagement & Experience team (student.engagement@ucl.ac.uk) know by **Thursday 10 March**. If you notice that a student is missing from the list after this date, please let the Student Engagement & Experience team know as soon as possible, as it may still be possible to add them.

Removals

The criteria for removal from the survey cohort are as follows:

- Students who are dormant (taking time out of study) – both those who became dormant prior to the 1 November 2021 and those who have become dormant up to the start of the survey window (19 April 2022).
- Students who are seriously ill or deceased.
- Students studying courses where the majority of delivery is overseas.
- Incoming exchange students.
- Students on research-based Master's (e.g. MRes) or Doctorate programmes.

If there are any students on your list who meet any of the criteria for removal, please notify the Student Partnership team (student.engagement@ucl.ac.uk) know by **Thursday 10 March**. If you notice that a student needs to be removed from the list after this date, please let the Student Engagement & Experience team know as soon as possible, as it may still be possible to remove them.

Check-list of actions for the PGSLO to undertake for the PGS

Local promotion of the survey:

- Post a message on the departmental (or equivalent) Moodle site publicising the PGS with links to the website: www.thepostgradsurvey.co.uk
- Share weekly response rate updates with relevant departmental teaching / support staff and Student Academic Representatives.
- Encourage lecturers / tutors to ask students to participate in the PGS and explain that teaching staff play a vital role in communicating with their students about the survey.
- Add the PGS as an agenda item in the Departmental Teaching Committee (DTC) or equivalent, and the Staff Student Consultative Committee (SSCC). You may also wish to share results and open text comments from [previous editions of the PTES](#).
- Encourage your department's Student Reps and any relevant student societies to promote the survey.

Raise awareness of changes that have been made in response to student feedback. You can find examples on [the You Shaped UCL pages](#), but students may be particularly impressed by changes at departmental level.

Consider the use of social media, such as Twitter, Instagram, Facebook etc. Student Reps may also want to share these social media posts.

- Ask Heads of Departments, programme directors etc. to send an email message to students (suggested in Appendix B).

It may also be worth mentioning to students that Ipsos MORI's reminder communications only go to students who have not yet completed the survey. Consequently, the sooner they complete their questionnaire, the fewer reminders they will receive.

Ideas and good practice from survey liaison officers in other campaigns*

- Arrange group sessions where students can complete the survey. You could also invite the Head of Department or other senior departmental figures (such as the Departmental Graduate Tutor or equivalent). Some departments use these meetings to also provide information on exam and revision techniques, careers advice, or as part of Personal Tutoring meetings.
- Give students 10 minutes at the end of a lecture, seminar or revision session to complete the survey.

* Please let the Student Engagement & Experience team know of any of your own activities that may be good practice that other departments can use and we will circulate them as examples.

Appendix A - Key eligibility questions

- **If a student has changed course, which course will they be surveyed under?**
 - Students will be surveyed under the course that they are currently registered for.
- **Are students with an undefined course length eligible to be included?**
 - Yes, students without a defined course length or end date should be surveyed if they entered their second consecutive year of active study after 1 August 2021. Students studying without an end date who began their course in the 2021-22 academic year and are known to have completed more than 66% of the requirements by the start of the survey period (19 April 2022) should also be included.
- **Should students on a work placement be included?**
 - Yes, students on work placements should be included in the survey.
- **Are students studying towards an MRes eligible to take part in the PGS?**
 - No, students studying towards an MRes are not eligible for the PGS. They will be surveyed separately in the Postgraduate Research Survey (PRES), which is overseen by the UCL Doctoral School.

Appendix C - Key messages for lecturers

- The PGS opens on 19 April 2022 for final-year taught postgraduates in the UK. Ipsos MORI will contact eligible students on 19 April.
- This is an opportunity for postgraduate students to give their honest feedback.
- The survey covers teaching, academic support, assessment and feedback, course organisation and management, learning resources such as the library and IT.
- The survey is conducted by Ipsos MORI, an independent research agency and responses are completely anonymous.
- It usually takes around 10 minutes to complete, and can be completed at www.thepostgradsurvey.co.uk
